### Prayer for Illumination

Community Readers:

With the beginning of Lent, we are often reminded of our own difficulties and struggles. Sometimes the way has seemed too dark. Sometimes we feel like our lives have been obscured by such grief and pain it is increasingly hard to reach out for help, it feels easier to be alone, or to remain silent, we simply cannot see how our story will end.

But in the midst of our weakness, we ask that you would be strong.

Sometimes, as we look at our lives, we are disappointed or even ashamed.

We know that we haven't been the people we could or should have been, or the people we would like to think we are.

Often we feel trapped by the past, limited by the present.

The past holds us back; we have got stuck in a rut.

Do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way he took the cup, saying:  
this cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood,  
shed for you for the forgiveness of sins.  
Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me.

Remembering all your mighty and merciful acts,  
we take this bread and this wine from the gifts you have given us,  
and celebrate with joy the redemption won for us in Jesus Christ.  
Accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving  
as a living and holy offering of ourselves,  
that our lives may proclaim the One crucified and risen.

**Great is the mystery of faith:  
Christ has died,  
Christ is risen,  
Christ will come again.**

Gracious God, pour out your Holy Spirit upon us  
and upon these your gifts of bread and wine,  
that the bread we break and the cup we bless  
may be the communion of the body and blood of Christ.  
By your Spirit unite us with the living Christ  
and with all who are baptized in his name,  
that we may be one in ministry in every place.  
As this bread is Christ's body for us,  
send us out to be the body of Christ in the world.

Lead us, O God, by the power of your Spirit

Keep our eyes fixed on Jesus Christ until this mortal life is ended,  
and all that is earthly returns to dust.  
Give us strength to serve you faithfully until the promised day  
of resurrection, when, with the redeemed of all the ages,  
we will feast with you at your table in glory.

Through Christ, all glory and honor are yours, almighty God,  
with the Holy Spirit in the holy church,  
now and forever. **Amen.**
